















DEBRIS BURNING

With proper permits, eliminates unwanted small amounts of dry leaves, plant clippings, brush, paper, and clean, untreated-unpainted wood.

- Consider alternatives to burning, such as recycling or composting
- Check with local fire officials in your area before burning
- If you decide to burn, burn when the ground is completely snow-covered
- · Comply with all forest fire laws and regulations

FUN FACT

'Debris fires' account for nearly one-third of the average annual 5,000 acres burned every year in Wisconsin!

CAMPFIRES

OB

A small controlled fire used for cooking or warming by burning clean dry wood. Burning debris (garbage, leaves and brush) is not a campfire and may result in a citation!

Be safe with your campfire:

- Maintain a 3-foot clearing down to mineral soil and surround by rocks or a fire pit
- · Keep plenty of water and a shovel handy
- · Make sure your fire is dead out and cold before you leave!

FUN FACT

Campfires solely used for cooking or warming do not require a burning permit!

SMOKEY BEAR

JOB

Serves as the living symbol of wildfire prevention and education around the country.

Wildfire prevention attempts to reduce the damage from wildfire through education, engineering, and enforcement. Smokey's job is education and public awareness and he has been teaching all ages since August 9, 1944, when a real bear cub was saved from a wildfire in New Mexico.

FUN FACT

Smokey's official name is actually "Smokey Bear," not "Smokey the Bear." The article 'the' arrived after a song was written and an extra syllable was needed!

PRESCRIBED FIRE

JOB

Serves as an efficient and effective tool in land management and wildfire hazard reduction.

- · Always planned under specified conditions
- · Reduces fuels and prevents destructive wildfires
- Creates more diverse habitats for wildlife
- Special burning permits are issued by DNR or local fire departments

Smokey's phrase, "Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires" changed to "Only You Can Prevent **Wildfires**" to clarify the difference between controlled fires (prescribed) and the uncontrolled-unwanted fires (wildfires).

FORESTRY TECHNICIAN

OB

Provides forest management and fire suppression assistance to Foresters and Forester Rangers.

- Incorporates integrated forest management practices
- Maps woodlands, determines timber volumes, marks timber for harvest
- Guides and assists private landowners during planting
- Provides technical service related to Forest Tax Law administration
- · Assists in wildfire suppression, pre-suppression, and prevention
- · Operates, repairs, and maintains fire equipment

Wisconsin's fire season typically runs in the spring, just after the snow cover disappears and vegetation is dry!

FIREFIGHTING EQUIPMENT

Designed to effectively protect and assist Wisconsin DNR staff when suppressing wildland fires.

CAPABILITY

Wildland firefighters wear different protective clothing than structural firefighters who wear turnout gear. Wildland firefighters wear lightweight Nomex (fire resistant) clothing along with leather gloves and boots. This allows firefighters to be more mobile while carrying a 5-gallon backcan, pulaski, and fire shelter.

FUN FACT

Nomex material is fire-resistant, not fire-proof. This means the clothing will not catch on fire and spread, but a flying ember may burn a hole in your shirt!

YPE 4 (3-TON PUMPER/TANKER) ENGINI

OB

Suppresses wildland fires in Wisconsin, especially larger fires or smaller intense fires in hard-to-get-to places.

Hauls the tractor-plow unit on a tilt

Can spray class A foam, which prevents water from evaporating quickly. The Type 4 engine is also used (i.e. lakes, rivers, and swimming pools) Uses a pump to apply and draft water Carries 850 gallons of water for structural protection sonrces

INGLE ENGINE AIR TANKER (S.E.A.T.)

Fights wildland fires from the air and slows the fire until ground units arrive on scene.

Holds 550 gallons of foam,

or retardant water

Can drop its water mixture to cover 100-feet-wide 1400-feet-long mph with its 58-foot wingspan

DNR contracts out for SEATs in the spring through private companies and are pre-positioned according to fire severity Tops out at 120
